

Springfield Homework Policy

Springfield is a Rights Respecting School

Article 28

Children have the right to learn and go to school.

Article 29

Children have the right to become the best that they can be.

The purpose of homework is to:

- Develop an effective partnership between the school, parents and other carers in pursuing the aims of the school.
- Consolidate and reinforce skills and understanding, particularly in English and mathematics.
- Exploit resources for learning of all kinds at home.
- Extend school learning, for example, through additional reading and research.
- Encourage pupils, as they grow older to develop the confidence and self-discipline needed to study on their own, and to prepare them for the requirements of junior school.

The purpose of homework changes as children become older but it will always be age appropriate. For children in Key Stage 1, developing a partnership with parents or carers and involving them actively in their children's learning is our key purpose. Other activities children do at home, e.g. shopping with you, looking at door numbers on the way home from school, telling the time, will also support their learning.

As children grow older, homework provides an opportunity for children to develop the skills of independent learning and this will increasingly become its main purpose. At Springfield, gradually we want our children to devote periods of time, which may not be long, to study on their own.

The programme of homework activities for children in Key Stage 1 has been designed to take, on average, about one hour per week.

For children in EYFS and Year 1, homework will largely consist of regular reading with parents and carers and looking at books together. Other short activities include simple language and number games. These games provide a very important opportunity for young children to talk about what they are learning, to an interested adult, and to practise key skills in a supportive environment.

For children in Year 2, English related homework will include learning spellings and practising correct punctuation. Furthermore, there will be an opportunity to practise mathematical key skills and solve problems. In addition, children will be provided with an additional homework sheet, which focuses on topic related creative activities.

We also have a 'Maths Monkey' that goes home with a different child every week provides opportunities for [problem solving and encourages children to work with their adults at home providing an important connection between maths at home and at school.

Time allocation for homework (as recommended by the Government):-

Reception	As appropriate up to one hour per week,
(Foundation Stage)	including reading and phonics activities.
Years One and Two	English and mathematics work up to one
(Key stage 1)	hour plus ten minutes daily reading per
	week is recommended.

Springfield will ensure that homework will be properly planned and organised so that:

- Children are not expected to do too much.
- The tasks they are set are realistic, within the time available.
- The tasks are clearly related to the work children are doing in school.
- Children are given feedback on their homework.

Monitoring and Evaluation

The main aim of the homework policy is to help pupils make good progress at school and to develop positive attitudes to learning. As this is important for all children, we will take the following steps if children are regularly not completing their homework:

- 1. After two weeks of homework not being completed, or if sharing a book at home is occurring less than 3 times the class teacher will discuss this with the parent/carer.
- 2. If homework still needs to be completed then the class teacher will speak with the parent/carer again to identify the barriers to learning at home and offer further help.
- 3. At the end of each half term class teachers will speak to the head teacher about children who do not do homework.
- 4. To help with transition Springfield School will let the child's next school know if they need help to complete their homework.

Evaluation of homework activities will be monitored over time by sampling spelling books, homework books, reading diaries and mathematics tasks within year groups and with the whole staff, to consider the progress made and the feedback from parents and carers.

This policy will be reviewed annually.
